Non-Public: I have two items for Non-public Session under Personnel.

BUDGET:

The Command Staff conducted two (2) internal FY 19 budget reviews this past month (August 2019). So far, we are coming in at just over 4 percent underspent for the end of the 31st week of the FY 19 Budget in Police and approximately 1 percent underspent in Dispatch. We have started our FY 2020 budget construct as of 6 August. After the COMSTA portion of this meeting we will move into a Commission review of the 2020 proposed budget.

PERSONNEL:

Benjamin Church has passed his entrance PT test and has reported to the Academy on 3 Sept. All is going well. He is approximately four (4) weeks into the Academy with another twelve (12) weeks to go-we wish him well.

Operations (Criminal Investigations and Prosecutions):

In terms of Police investigations, and prosecution, August continues to be heavy month for the Wolfeboro PD. The PD continues to work on some major investigations and major prosecutions. I expect that these matters will persist into the early fall. In terms of Police Prosecutions; this past month we saw twenty-nine (29) defendants who responded to thirty-two (32) Charges; of those thirty-two (32) Charges, twenty-five (25) plead or were found Guilty at trial; and one (1) was Null Prosed because the defendant was deemed incompetent to stand trial by the Judge. Additionally, six (6) defendants agreed to have their cases Placed on File (POF) pending good behavior for six months or more, with diversion, education, and restitution component(s) added to their sentences. The conviction rate this past month is 96.87 % with approximately \$17,197.62 dollars in fines, penalties and restitution meted out-crime does not pay.

Dispatch: Under matters of concern this past month, Wolfeboro Central Dispatch sustained a major and near catastrophic failure of a mother board component, an integral part of our Dispatch Console. Used, but newer component systems have

arrived as of 10 Sept 2019, and Repairs have begun. I will continue to keep all our officials updated on this important repair issue.

Motor Vehicle Enforcement: Speed issues continue to be a problem in our community. Please pay attention to the posted speed limits on our Town roads-speed complaints represent some of the most common quality of life issues we receive at the PD. Please be courteous of your friends and neighbors and don't speed. We will be monitoring our roads very carefully-if you are speeding-please slow down, the life you save may be your own-thank-you!

That being said: The Department is continuing its enhanced speed enforcement operations in the following areas: Lehner Street, Forrest Road, Cotton Valley and College Road areas, Beach Pond Road with a focus on the area between Pine Hill Road and North Line Road, Center Street, North Main Street, 109 East, Bay Street and Sewell Road. The reason for these speed enforcement operations is due to citizen complaints and data collected and analyzed by our radar trailer. We will continue our efforts in these areas until we are sure that the speeds have come down. If you travel these roads, please be mindful of the posted speed limits.

BUDGET: Straight and true (about 4 percent under spent as of 9/19/19) and about 1 percent underspent for Wolfeboro Central Dispatch. However, please remember that we still have approximately three (3) months left in the Town's Fiscal Year and anything can happen; incidentally, we have had some major repair bills in Dispatch for the console. The next update will be in the Third Qtr. during the October Police Commission Meeting.

Just a quick word on the FY 2020 budget process: Following this presentation. I will brief the Commission on the FY 2020 budget proposal, and I will seek a vote from the Commission to move forward after any budget adjustments the Commission wishes to make. For our viewers and listeners, please be mindful that the PD has been working on the Budget since the end of July, and the PD's Budget Team consisting of myself, the Captain, Sherri Moore, my Executive Administrative Assistant, Commissioner Robert O'Brien, Budget Committee Member Thomas Bell, Budget Committee Member Matthew Plance, and Selectman Paul O'Brien have already been hard at work building the PD's FY 2020 budget. Additionally, this construction has taken place with guidance from the BOS, The Town Manager and the Town Finance Officer, all of whom are or were involved to some extent. In short, there has been a lot of very hard work which has already gone into this budget, and the Commission has had this proposed budget for the last three weeks-reviewing it before this meeting. Many adjustments have already happened at many levels. This product is what I consider a 95 percent solution moving forward for final review and vote before it moves to the Town Manger and the Honorable Board of Selectman to be further reviewed and adjusted as they see fit prior to being forwarded to the Budget Committee. This is indeed a long and daunting process-it is meant to be and is

designed to ensure an accurate and concise "no frills" budget to the Town,a nd to ensure the PD has the adequate resources to execute its core missions and tasks-thank-you!
