Current Situation

- ♦ Town of Wolfeboro issued an RFP for Ambulance Services.
- ♦ Received Two Bids containing multiple options.
- ♦ Incumbent provider did not bid on the contract.
- ♦ Current Ambulance Contract Expires December 31, 2023 (Stewarts Ambulance).
- ♦ Wolfeboro Fire Rescue currently licensed as "Non-Transport EMS Unit"
- Wolfeboro Fire Rescue is not equipped with an Ambulance for Transport Services.

Members of the Wolfeboro Selectboard:

I want to explain our decision not to provide a proposal to Wolfeboro's RFP.

In addition to serving as the Chair of Stewart's for the last 17 years I also own the majority of Municipal Resources and have worked with dozens of communities to address their EMS needs. Given my experience and my discussions with the town, I believe that the best EMS option for Wolfeboro – in terms of both quality and cost - is to have Wolfeboro Fire provide the primary 911 response. Stewart's came to a similar conclusion in Laconia in 2018.

For over a decade, Stewart's has provided you a very high quality of service at an incredibly low cost to your taxpayers. Demographic changes (i.e. an older population that needs more EMS services) have significantly reduced our revenue per patient transported. This trend accelerated rapidly during COVID. Previously, Stewart's lost money on the Wolfeboro 911 contract but we made enough servicing Huggins Hospital to offset those losses. Today, we lose far more money on the 911 contract and no longer make enough servicing Huggins to offset our loses.

Although Stewart's is not providing a bid we are willing to help the town in any way that we can. Should Wolfeboro so choose, our help could include:

- Extending Stewart's existing contract in the short term if Wolfeboro needs additional time to
 operationalize its own ambulance service.
- Using our purchasing power to purchase an ambulance faster and cheaper than Wolfeboro might be
 able to on their own.
- · Using Stewart's Wolfeboro ambulances as a back-up to the town's 911 needs.

We appreciate the opportunity to serve the residents of Wolfeboro for the last 12 years and hope to continue working together in whatever capacity is best for Wolfeboro and its residents.

Problem

- ♦ Ambulance services equitant to the level Wolfeboro is accustomed are expensive.
- ♦ The Town is currently not in position to take on such services.
 - ♦ PSB Construction
 - ♦ Equipment
 - ♦ Funding
 - ♦ Staffing
- ♦ Level of Service
 - ♦ Paramedic
 - ♦ Advanced-Emergency Medical Technician
 - ♦ Emergency Medical Technician

Solution

- Enter one-year contract with Stewarts Ambulance.
- ♦ Fire-Rescue hold Public Information Sessions prior to 2024 Town Meeting.
- ♦ Create three (3) Warrant Articles for consideration in 2024.
 - ♦ Fire-Based Ambulance Services Beginning January 1, 2025 (staffing).
 - ♦ Lease Purchase of New Ambulance.
 - ♦ Establishment of Ambulance Revolving Fund.
- ♦ Should Article(s) Fail Re-issue RFP for New Contracted Ambulance Services to begin operations January 1, 2025.

♦ Addressing Problem

- ♦ PSB will have reached a point where Ambulance Services could be operated from that location beginning January 1, 2025.
- ♦ Hold a Public Hearing on September 6, 2023, BOS meeting for the purpose of discussing use of existing Capital Reserve Funds to secure used & outfitted Ambulance.
- ♦ Secure one-year contract extension with Stewart's Ambulance. (December 31, 2024)
- ♦ January 1, 2025, Fire-Based Ambulance Services start date allows:
 - ♦ Time for staff to become confident & comfortable caring for patients during transport.
 - ♦ Time for staff to secure additional training.
 - ♦ Spreads start up costs over three fiscal years rather than two.
 - ♦ Reduces the chance of impact negotiation-current employment contract expires December 31, 2024.

NHRSA 31:95-h Revolving Funds

A town may, by vote of the legislative body, establish a revolving fund. Each revolving fund shall be limited to one of the following purposes: Providing ambulance services, or fire services, or both

Staffing Level of 22

- ♦ 42-hour work week rather than 48 hour
- Greater depth of staff
- Minimum staffing level of 5
 - ♦ Two Engine
 - ♦ Two Ambulance
 - One float between Engine/Ambulance assignment
- Most closely represents services delivered today.
- Significant increases
 - Wages & Benefits

Staffing Level of 15

- ♦ 48-hour work week current operations
- Minimum staffing level of 4
 - ♦ Two Engine
 - ♦ Two Ambulance
- Most cost effective
- Opportunity for Staffing grants to grow Department reducing start-up costs to taxpayers.

Solution is likely somewhere in between these two options

Warrant Article I

Are you in favor of hiring **
Firefighter/EMT's effective December 2024 for the purposes of operating 911 ambulance services effective January 1, 2025 as part of the Wolfeboro Fire Rescue Department. If this article passes it will funds will become part of the Fire Rescue Department Operating Budget in Future years. Should this Warrant Article Fail then the Town shall enter into a contract with a new ambulance service provider effective January 1, 2025.

Warrant Article II

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a long-term lease in the amount of \$XXX,XXX payable over a term of XX years for the purpose of entering into a lease purchase agreement for a new fire department ambulance, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$XXX,XXX in 2024 for the down payment to be followed by XX annual payments currently estimated as follows

Warrant Article III

To see if the Town will under NHRSA the provisions of NHRSA 31:95-h-I(b) and NHRSA 31:95-h-I(c) to establish an Ambulance and Fire services revolving fund. Monies in this account shall be used for the purchase of Capital Equipment and expendables for Ambulance and Fire operations. Any purchase in excess of \$xxxxx must receive authorization from the Board of Selectmen, expenses less than \$xxxxx maybe approved by the Town Manager. XX% of revenues from the operation of the 911 ambulance service shall be placed in this revolving fund with the balance to be accounted for in the general fund.

♦ Next Steps

- ♦ September 6, 2023 Public Hearing to receive input from citizen RE: using existing Capital Reserve fund to purchase a used Ambulance.
- ♦ Work with Stewarts Ambulance Service to Secure 1 year contract.
- ♦ Fire Chief to begin holding public input session.
- ♦ Continue development of the "911 Ambulance Services Business Plan" for 2024 Budget Process.
